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What to Expect

As part of MIFF's mission to be a leader in accessible services for cinema-going audiences, we are offering this Sensory Friendly Screening of the film *The Cats of Gokogu Shrine*.

To make this session sensory-friendly, we will be making a number of changes:

- The cinema space will have house lights that remain at an 'Airplane Night Time' level.
- The sound will be reduced by a quarter.
- The space will have different social permissions granted to it, introduced at the start of the screening, that allow Neurodivergent audience members to act as they need to in order to self-soothe and exist comfortably within the theatre.

MIFF has an open-door policy for its film screenings by default, and the same will apply to this session. In addition, there will be a designated Quiet Space for you to remove yourself to in the case of sensory overload or if you wish to have some time to yourself.

All of this creates a unique viewing experience for you. You will be able to rock, stim, hum, filter any sensory input as desired and pace around the cinema as you please.

We are excited to be able to offer you this Sensory Friendly Screening so you get to experience this movie as it was always intended to be.


Below is the basic information:

- Forum has a main entrance located on Flinders Street.
- The main entrance has a small step up to two central doors.
- For step-free/wheelchair access, there is a ramped entry way through the right side of the main entrance.
- To access the cinema, there are large railed staircases to the left and right of the foyer. The two staircases contain multiple levels of steps that lead to an upstairs mezzanine containing a bar and refreshment area.
- For step-free/wheelchair access to the cinema level, there is a lift along the corridor on the left of the entrance foyer. Please see a MIFF Front of House staff member for lift access.


Getting Around the Venue

Once you have arrived at Flinders Street Station:




Cross the road to Fed Square.


Travel towards the public bathrooms and turn left down the ramp.



At the end of the ramp you will be out the front of ACMI.




The Forum is across the road to your left.




You can cross the road here.

When inside you will be taking two flights of stairs.




Map of the Venue

Film Info

A Wiseman-esque study of a Japanese village's Shinto shrine whose feline residents bring the local humans joy, solace and sometimes consternation.

The seaside village of Ushimado in Okayama is the home of filmmaker Kazuhiro Soda and his wife and producer Kiyoko Kashiwagi – as well as dozens of street cats. Having found a haven in the ancient Shinto shrine of Gokogu, the animals live in harmony with their human neighbours (for the most part), but there is disagreement on how best to manage them. Some people feed them; some volunteer to catch them for a desexing program; others are indifferent, preferring instead to tend the temple's gardens. Meanwhile, some forward-thinking locals see their potential as a tourism draw for the town.

When Soda and Kashiwagi settled in Ushimado, they quickly discovered the area's natural and communal beauty and decided to document it over the course of a year. The Cats of Gokogu Shrine is Soda's "Observational Film #10", made according to his self-imposed "10 commandments" that include doing no prior research and having no pre-set themes or goals; using long takes with no scripts, narration or super-imposed titles; and shooting himself, for as long as possible. The result is a charming portrait of a community united, and divided, by its spiritual centre and the endearing critters who live there.
